Summary/Action Minutes

The Together for All Ad Hoc Health Committee meeting convened at 3:04 p.m. with Supervisor Fortunato Bas presiding as Chair.

Roll Call: Supervisor Márquez and Supervisor Fortunato Bas were present.

I. INFORMATIONAL AND ACTION ITEM: Receive updates from the County Administrator's Office regarding:

Supervisor Fortunato Bas gave opening remarks and welcomed attendees. She noted that March is Women's History Month. Supervisor Fortunato Bas restated that ACT for All serves as a forum to coordinate proactive county responses to federal policies and budget impacts affecting vulnerable communities. The Chair expressed concern about the current federal administration's actions affecting healthcare, food assistance, immigration enforcement, gender-related federal policy changes and international conflict and rule-of-law issues. She emphasized Alameda County's commitment to supporting immigrant communities and maintaining vigilance.

Vice Chair Supervisor Marquez thanked staff, county colleagues, and partner agencies. She expressed pride in the Board's unanimous January vote and reaffirmed the county's commitment to protecting the well-being of Alameda County residents, especially immigrant and refugee communities.

Lori Cox, Chief Deputy County Administrator, provided a status update on county actions related to immigrant protections.

In January 2026, the Board adopted a resolution to prohibit the use of county-owned and controlled properties for federal civil immigration enforcement. To implement the policy, required actions have included posting signage at county sites, creating clear reporting procedures for employees and security guards, requiring immigration officers to identify themselves and clarify their role, developing downloadable sample signage for community property owners and providing Know Your Rights materials to the public.

The General Services Agency has identified 105 locations for signage. The estimated cost is \$500 per sign, including braille and installation posts if needed. The rollout will occur in phases and priority will be given to high-volume, public-facing locations. Draft communication protocols have been developed by many departments and are under review by labor representatives and County Counsel to create consistent countywide messaging with department-specific adaptations. Staff and contractors will receive training once protocols are finalized.

Next steps include continue phased signage implementation, finalize and train on communication/response protocols, coordinate regionally and with community partners and receive an Office of Immigrant and Refugee Affairs framework update in late April.

Speakers

Four (4) speakers commented on this item.

The Committee thanked Lori Cox for the update and noted that more information will be forthcoming at the next ACT for All meeting on April 30, 2026.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Bob Britton commented on the Sheriff's Office participation in the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP) and urged the county to end their contracted arrangement with this program and replace the funding that would be lost.

John Guerro commented that the committee members and speakers should lower the tone surrounding national political issues and has cited vandalism incidents at local Republican Party offices.

Sailaja Suresh, Deputy Chief of Strategy & Partnership, Alameda Office of Education, announced that over seventy (70) schools have signed up for "Supplies for Safe Pathways to School" and the Alameda County Office of Education Board passed a policy on February 10, 2026, prohibiting use of Office of Education property for federal civil immigration enforcement staging or operations.
