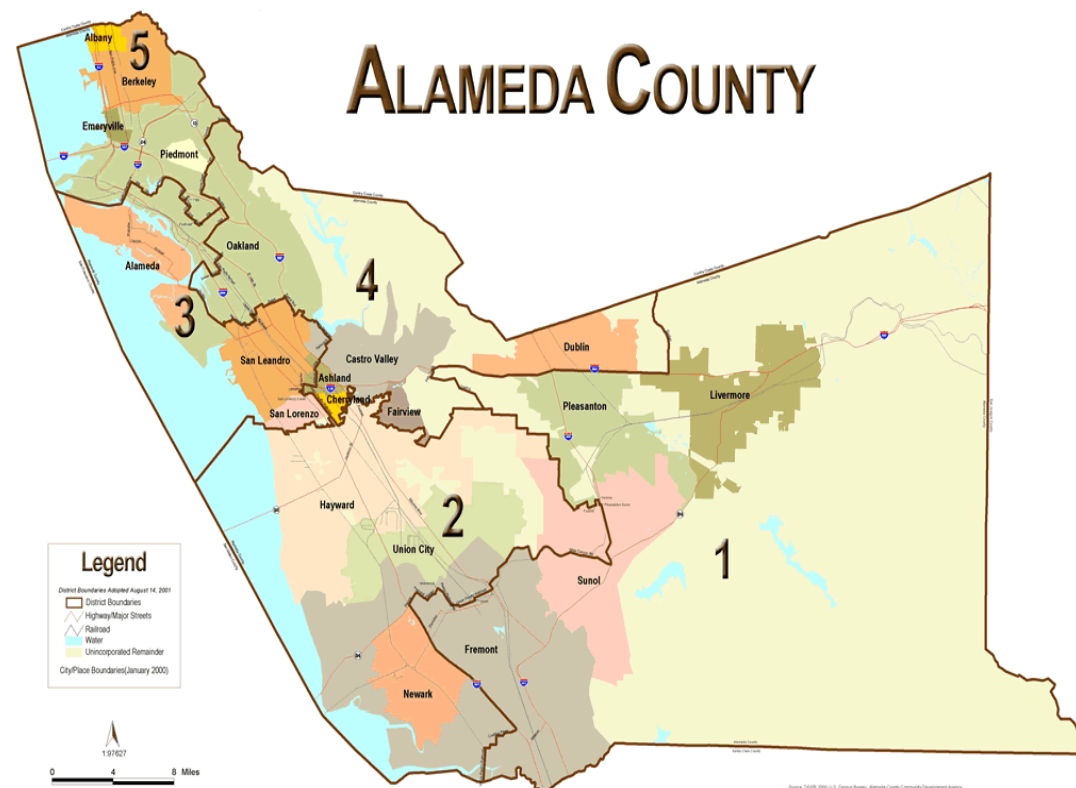

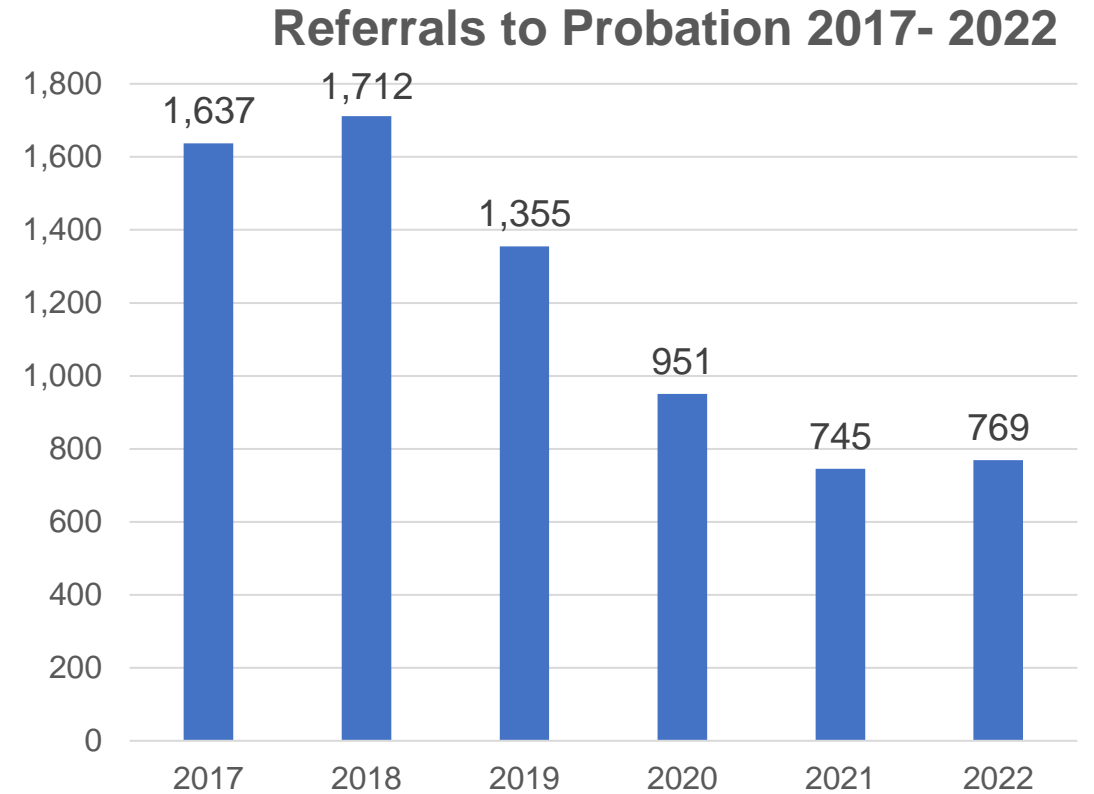
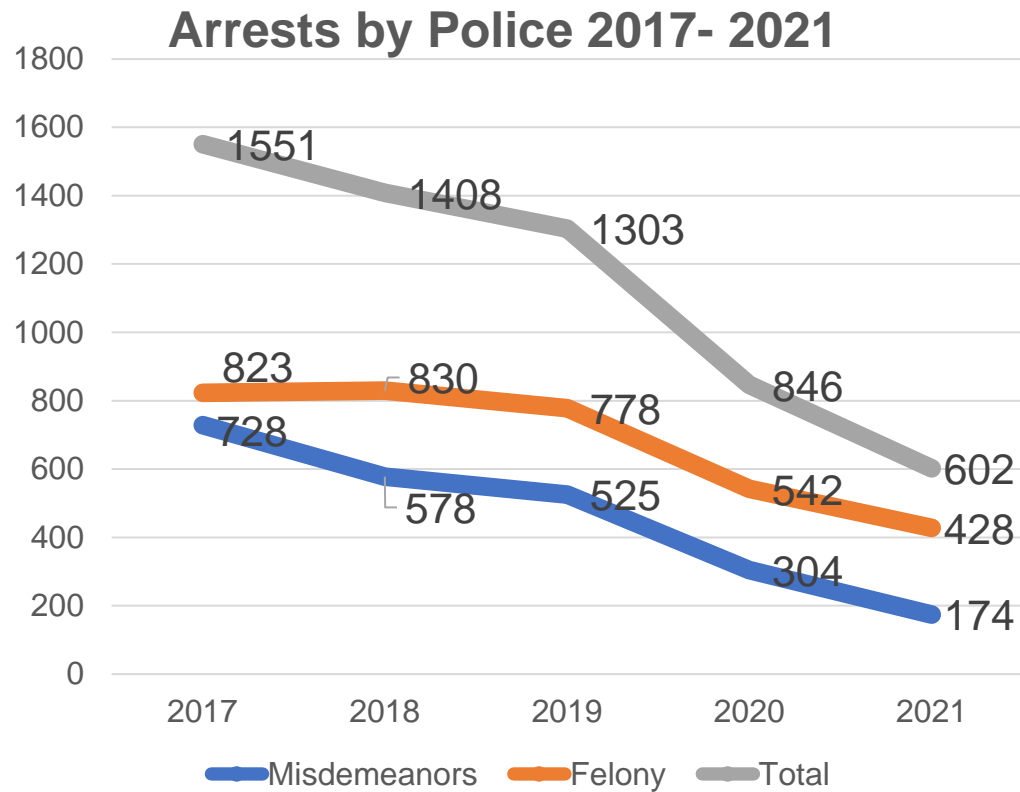


PRIORITIZATION OF AREAS OF RISK

- Alameda County is the seventh most populous county in California with a population of approximately 1,510,271 residents.
- The County consists of 14 incorporated cities and several unincorporated communities. Oakland is the seat of County government and the largest city.
- The County is racially/ethnically diverse. According to the US Census, there is no one racial/ethnic group that is a majority in the County.
- The youth population (age 10-17) of the County is approximately 149,857 or 10 percent of the total population.



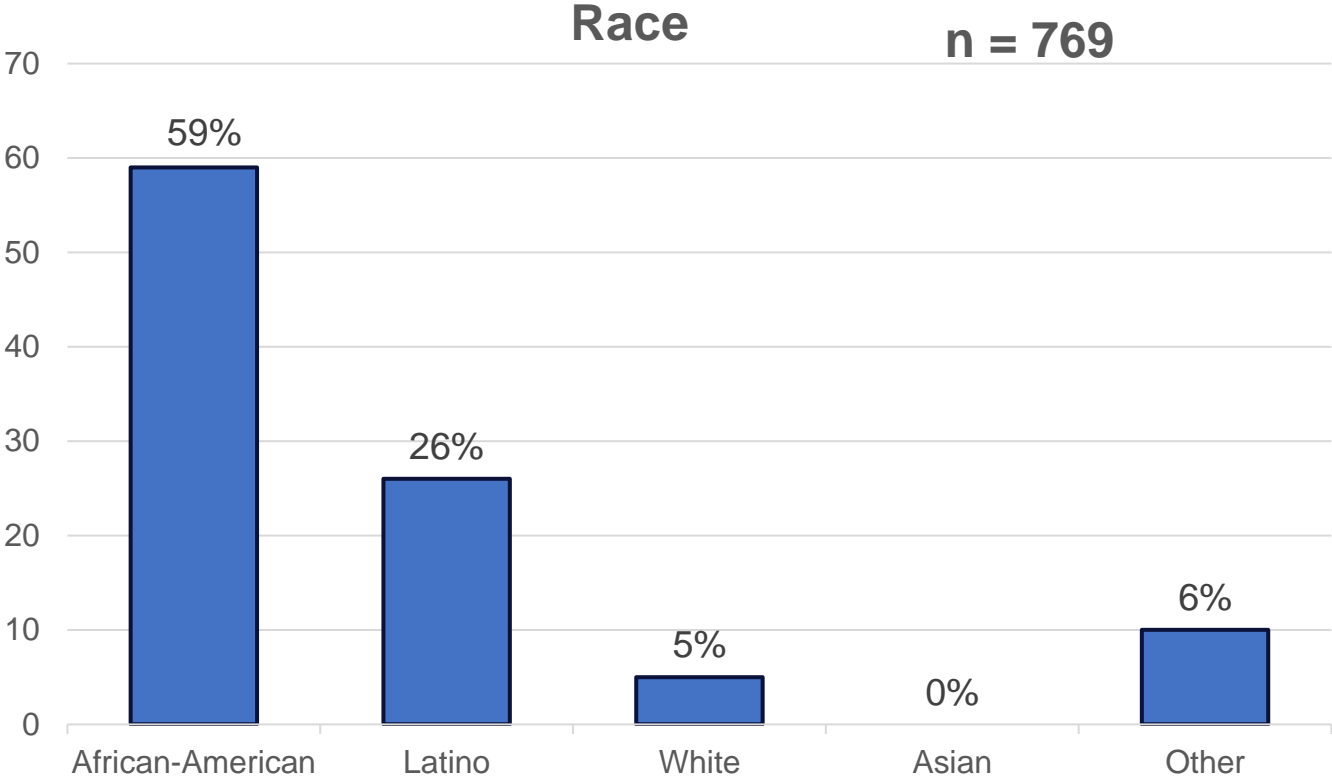
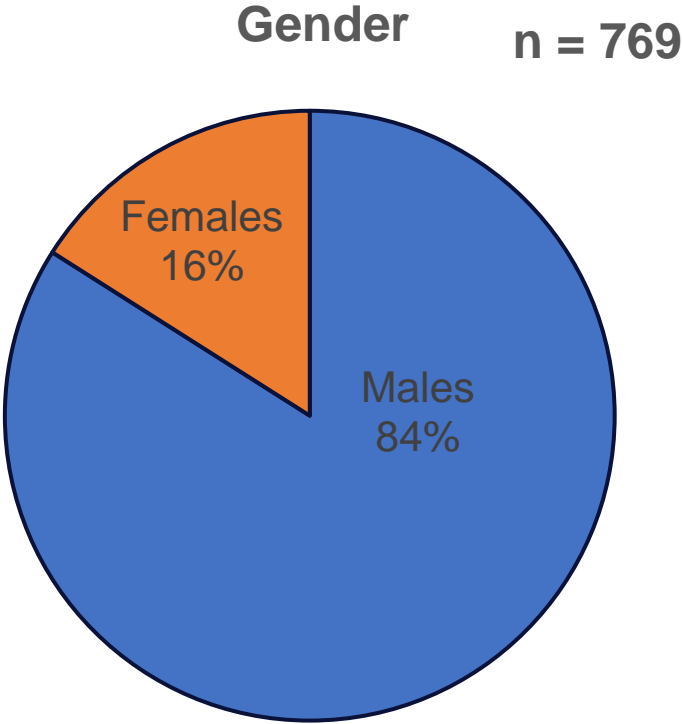
ARREST AND REFERRAL DATA FOR ALAMEDA COUNTY

REFERRALS TO ALAMEDA COUNTY PROBATION FOR 2022



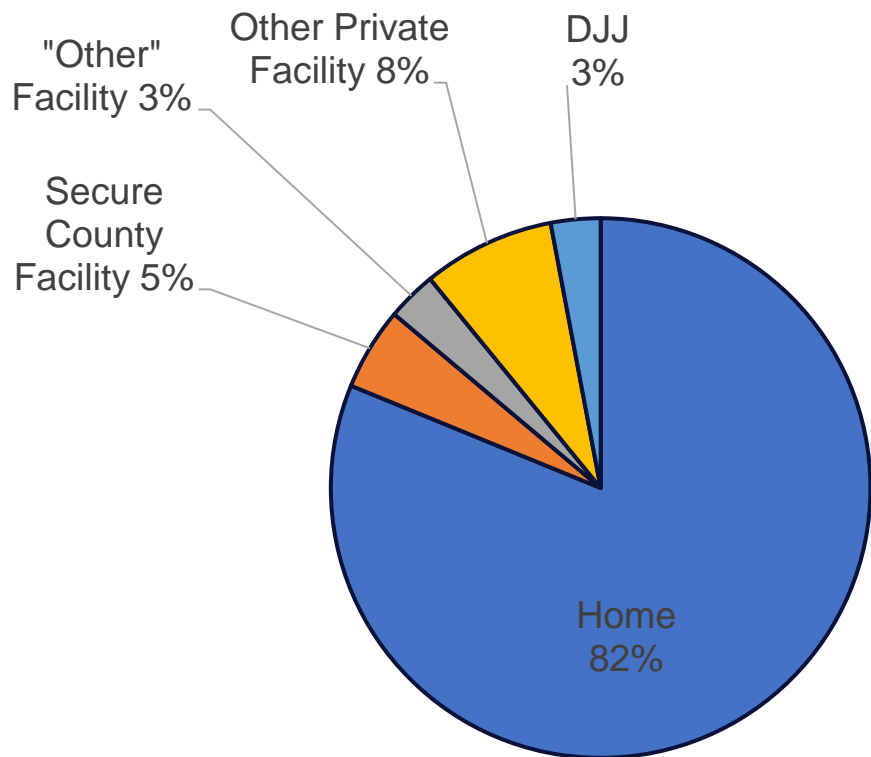

PLACEMENT OF YOUTH 2022

Placement of Youth on Probation

n = 309



- Most of the youth referred to ACPD are from Oakland (50%) and Hayward (9%).
- Similarly, youth on formal supervision are more likely to reside in Oakland and Hayward, 47% and 10% respectively.
- Most petitions filed resulted in a youth being placed on wardship probation, 252 (82%).

JUVENILE JUSTICE ACTION STRATEGY

Risk and Needs Assessment Tool

- Standardized risk and needs assessments provide structure and consistency to the decision-making process and provide the ability to focus on the identified strengths and needs of the youth.

Risk-Needs-Responsivity (RNR) Model

- The RNR model guides decision-making about supervision level and treatment interventions based on a youth's assessed likelihood for reoffending (risk), their identified highest criminogenic factors (need), and matching youth with the most appropriate interventions based on their characteristics and learning style (responsivity).

Evidence-Based Interventions

- Interventions either have demonstrated outcomes in reducing risk factors and addressing criminogenic needs, or they will be evaluated using performance measures to determine how effective they are with local youth.

Case Plans

- Individualized case plans are jointly created with the youth and family. Youth are then referred to an array of targeted community-based interventions and resources.

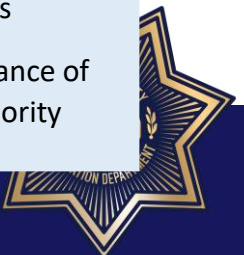
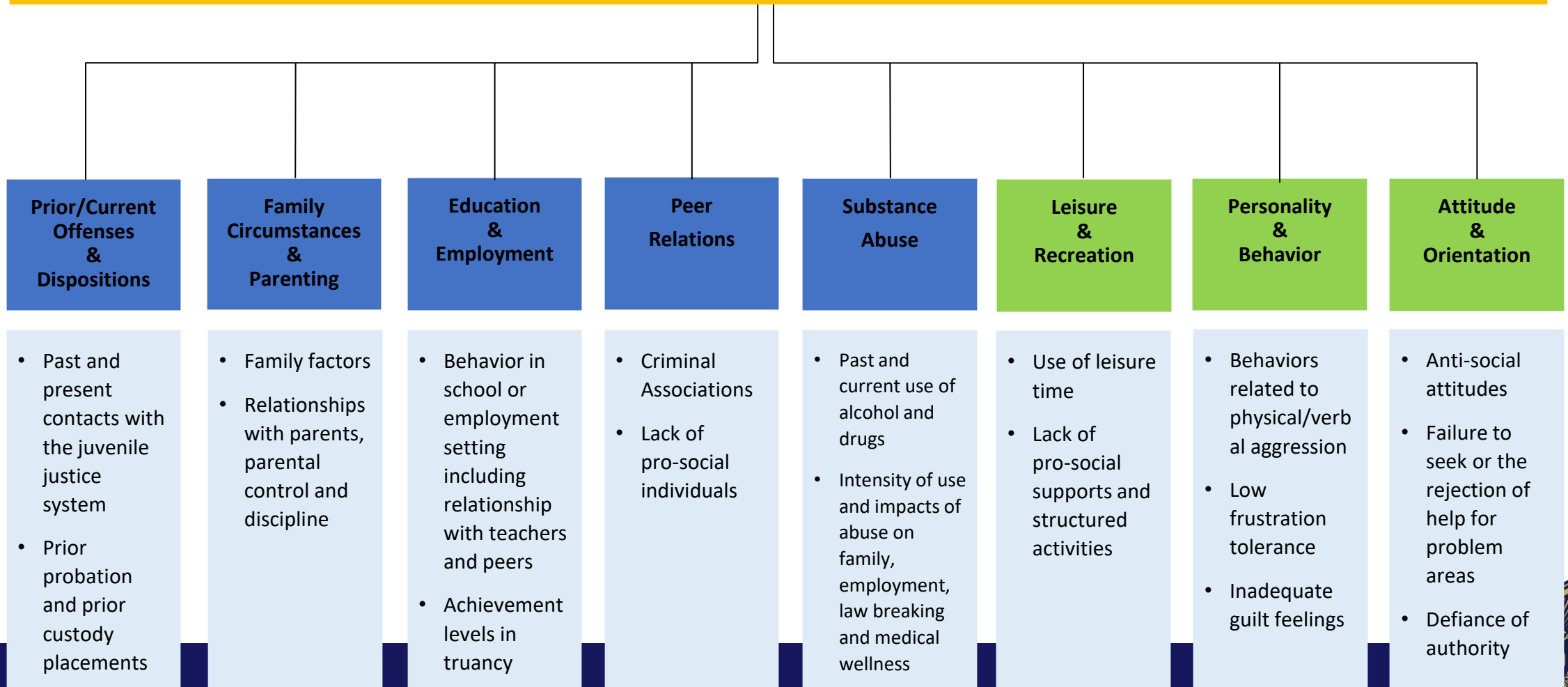


YOUTH LEVEL OF SERVICE/CASE MANAGEMENT INVENTORY ASSESSMENT

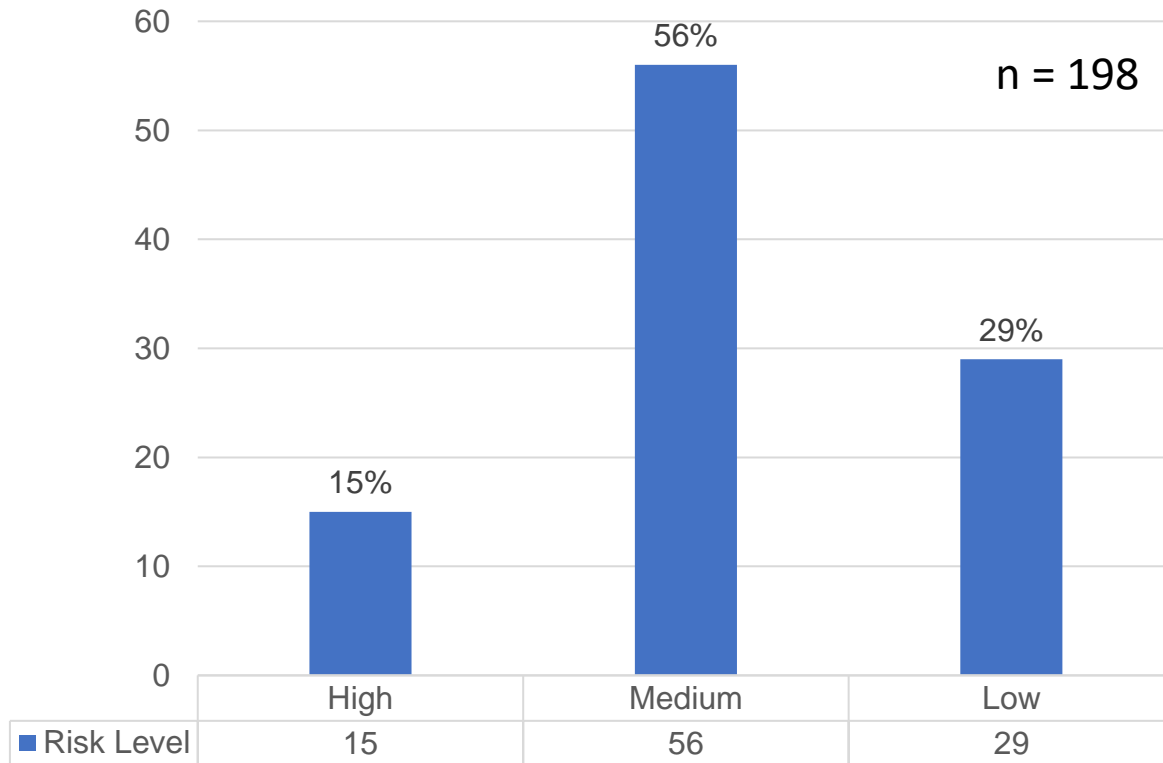
- Youth in Alameda County Probation are assessed using The Youth Level of Service/Case Management Inventory™ (YLS/CMI™), prior to disposition.
- The YLS/CMI helps youth workers, identify the youth's needs, strengths, barriers, and incentives; select the most appropriate goals for him or her; and produce an effective case management plan.
- The results of the risk/needs assessment, are considered in making a recommendation to the Court regarding Probation in the minor's home, placement in Camp, or a Placement facility.

OVERALL RISK LEVELS FOR YOUTH ON SUPERVISION IN ALAMEDA COUNTY APRIL 2023

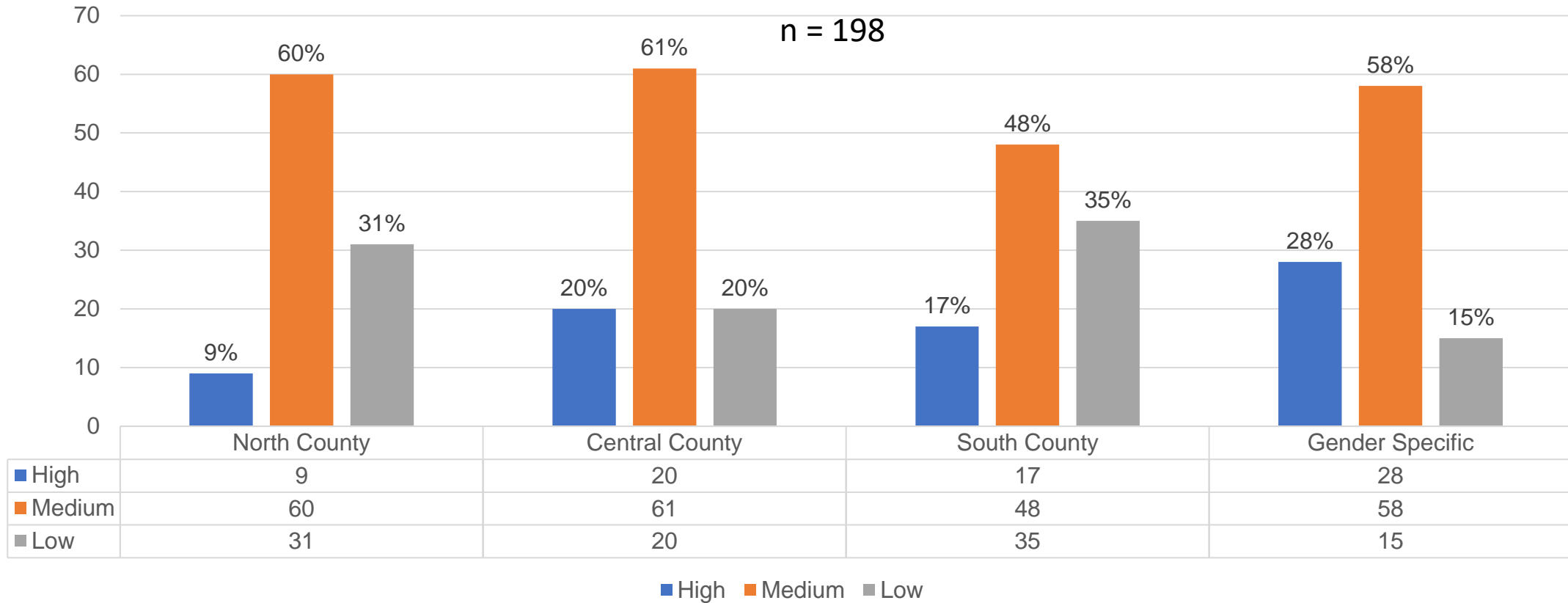


- Youth in Alameda County are assessed using the Youth Level of Service/Case Management Inventory (YLS/CMI), prior to disposition.
- The YLS/CMI identifies the youth's major needs, strengths, barriers, and incentives; helps select the most appropriate goals; and produce an effective case management plan.
- The results of the risk/needs assessment, in addition to other relevant facts, are considered in making a recommendation to the Court regarding Probation in the minor's home, placement in Camp, or a Placement facility.

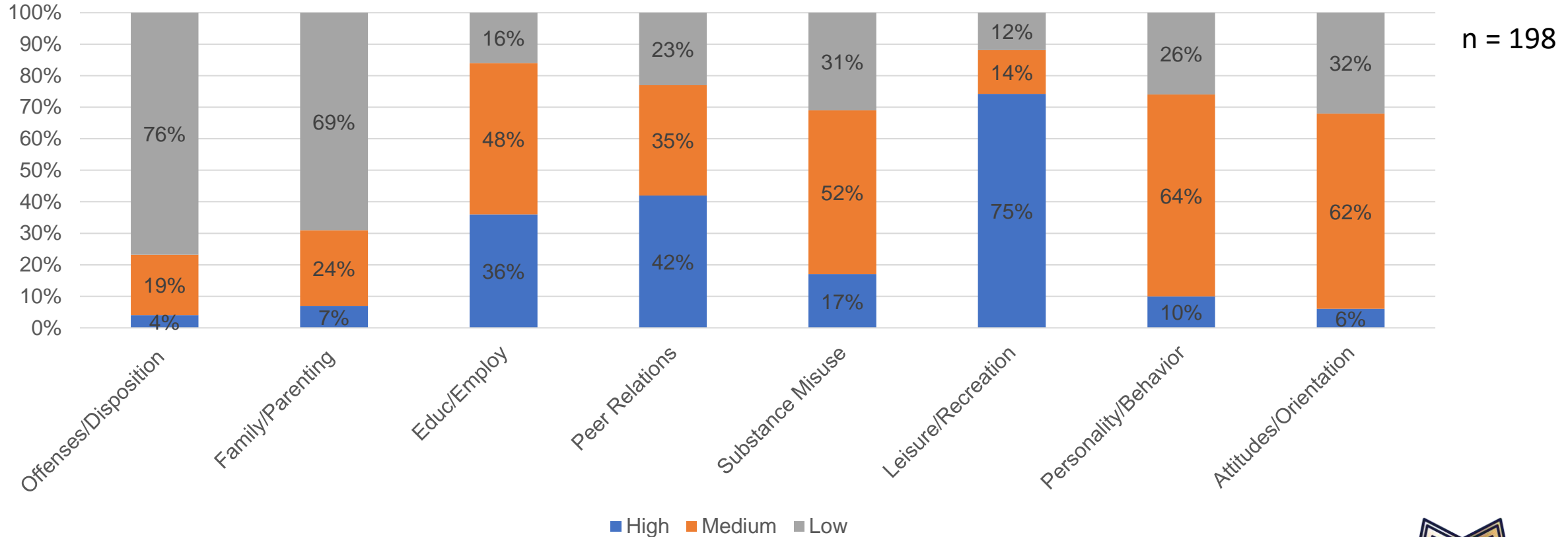
RISK LEVELS FOR YOUTH ON SUPERVISION IN ALAMEDA COUNTY BY REGIONAL UNIT APRIL 2023

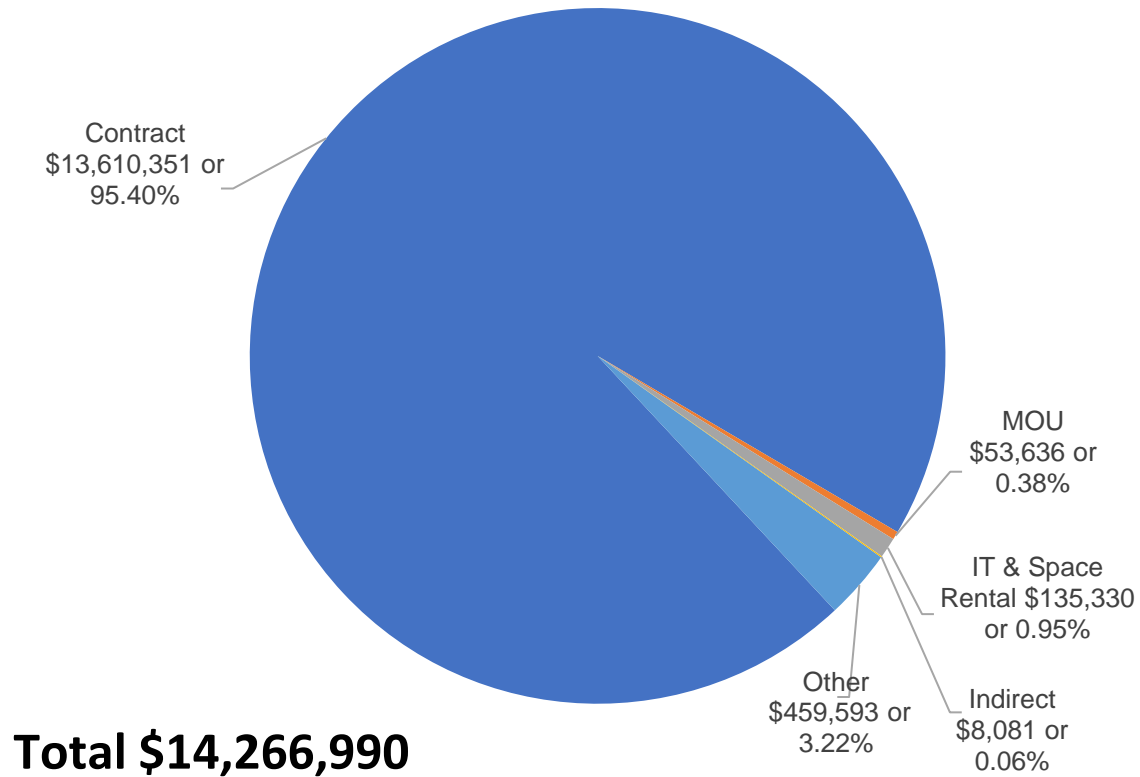

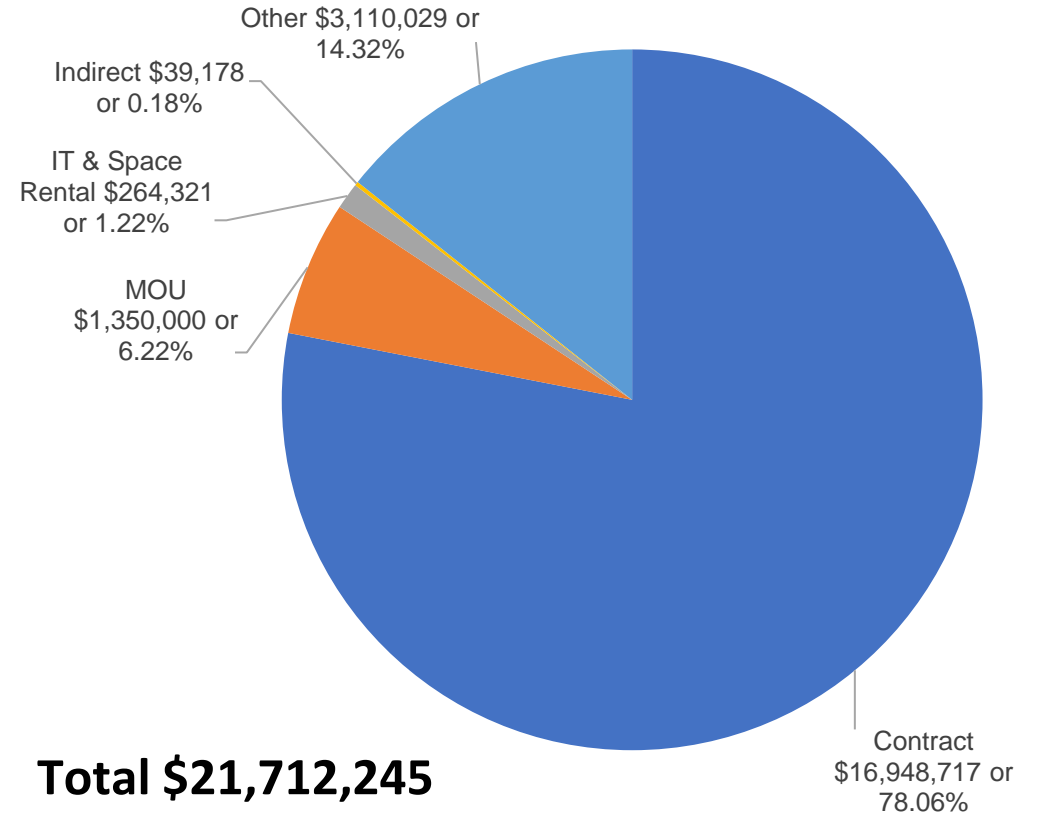


EXPENDITURES VERSUS BUDGET FY22/23

JJCPA SPENDING (YEAR TO DATE)

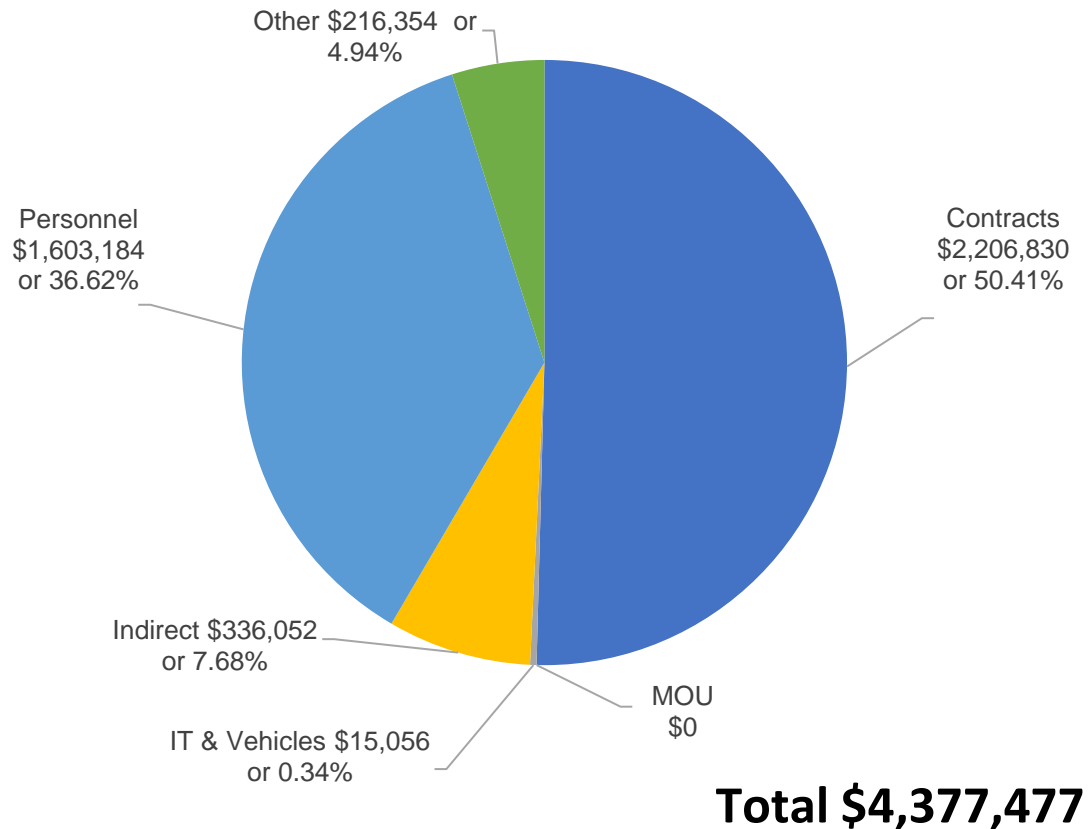


JJCPA BUDGET

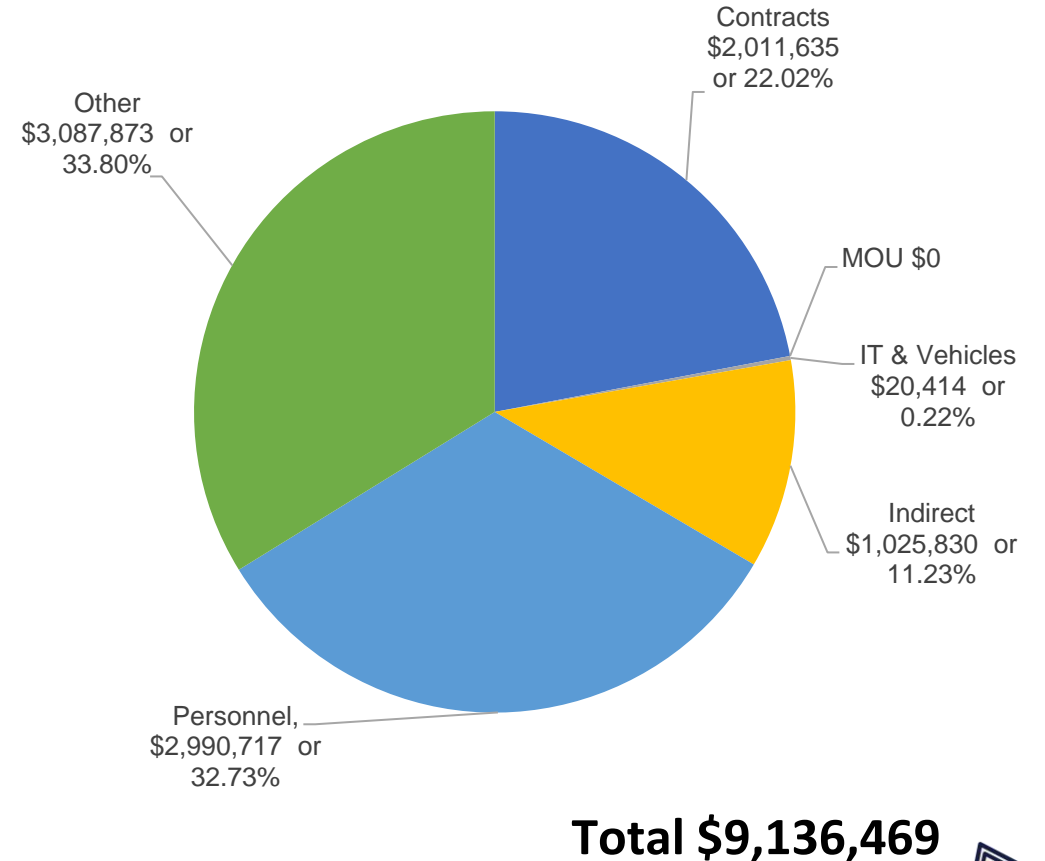


EXPENDITURES VERSUS BUDGET FY22/23
