# Busansky & Danielle Soto

**Question**: Is the role of Impact Justice to support the Subcommittee directly or partner with Probation to develop the plan?

**Answer**: Impact Justice is contracted with Probation to provide support to the Subcommittee.

**Question**: Will the agenda items come from Probation or the Subcommittee? **Answer**: Impact Justice's role is to be an impartial party to bring the work of the Subcommittee together.

**Question**: Why is the plan due to the Board on March 1, 2021, but due to the state September 2021 and will the shorter timeline impact the public input?

**Answer**: The Board must approve the plan in March because funding needs to be approved, Probation must negotiate with the Union, and prepare the programming, etc. The plan is the first phase in order for juvenile hall to be open for DJJ youth by July 1, 2021. A long-term plan will build on the first phase. The plan is due to the state by January 1, 2022 not September 2021.

**Question**: How long is the contract with Impact Justice? **Answer**: 18 months or two years and can be amended.

## Review of Existing Programming & Discussion of Identified Service Gaps Presentation by Adrienne Chambers

**Question**: Are the listed programs available at both Camp Sweeney and Juvenile Hall? **Answer**: No, some programs are only available at one or the other.

- The intent is to have career/technical training that provides meaningful opportunities for well-paying jobs or for youth to finish college degrees.
- Youth at Camp also have opportunities for employment in the community.
- A document was provided with detailed program descriptions. The Subcommittee was encouraged to be ready to discuss at the next meeting.

**Question**: Is there intention to add more programs. **Answer**: Yes, we will be adding and expanding programs.

 It was discussed that Probation is working on developing a Community Capacity Fund project. It will be a \$3M investment in addition to SB 823 funding.

Question: Is there demographics data available regarding gender identity and LGBTQ?

	Answer: Yes, the data is being captured. Probation has policies and procedures in place.
	<ul> <li>Question: Is virtual delivery of programs possible?</li> <li>Answer: Yes, Probation has made a large investment in providing virtual programming.</li> <li>Question: Would the CBO and other contract be able to include cost-of-living adjustments in multiple year contracts?</li> <li>Answer: Yes.</li> </ul>
Roundtable	Question: What is the final product of the Impact Justice contract?  Answer: The final report will be a plan to the State on how the County will implement the closure of the DJJ, the programs that will accommodate youth that would have gone to DJJ. The plan is comprehensive and will apply to the youth housed at the facility as well as reentry.
