2. April 6, 2021 Meeting Minutes: Minutes were reviewed and approved as written
3. Open CAB Seats:
 - a. New Member Gaylon Logan voted in by CAB; Mr. Logan represents District 4
 - b. Current CAB Vacancies – District 1: 1 open seats; District 2: 1* open seat; District 3: 0 open seats; District 4: 0 open seats; District 5: 0 open seats
4. Alameda County/ACPD/CAB Vision 2026 – The Challenges of the Past 4 Years vs. The Potential and Prospects for the Next 5 Years: (1) *Operation Elevate* initiative for juvenile youth – [Project A.W.A.R.E.](#) presentation; (2) Collaborate to reimagine and reinvest some of our extraordinary Alameda County Sheriff's Association resources to provide services and support for the community – build up and leverage additional funding opportunities outside of AB 109 dollars to provide supportive services to support our 16 distinctive reentry populations; (3) Continue to work with our statewide partners, District Attorney's office and victim's rights, advocacy and support groups to increase victim of crime eligibility and access; (4) Work collaboratively to provide free in-custody phone calls; (5) Work to ensure fiscal transparency among all government partners; (6) Work collaboratively to increase the CAB's visibility, viability and efficacy as an organized, statutorily historic body
5. Community/CAB Survey Results (Community Engagement Data from Both Town Halls and Individual Respondents from September 25, 2013 to December 31, 2020) – The 3 Components the Community Found Most Important: Tabled until the next meeting
6. Restorative Justice Restitution Program: Program designed with input from the community; the CAB would appreciate a full presentation on the program

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7. Conflict Resolution Update: Working on developing a conflict resolution model for use and approval by the CAB
8. Probation Update: Programs & Services Workgroup [Logic Modeling](#) & [CCP Report Presentation](#)
9. [2021 CCP Report](#): 2021 report did not capture all the work done by the CAB, CAB needs to put time aside to compile information for the report – recommendations that CAB focus on racism and highlight CAB's lived experience
10. Developing a Committee on the Needs of Victims: There are victims outside and inside the system – everyone who has experienced victimization should consider joining the subcommittee
11. Vaccinations for the Justice Impacted Without Phone/Internet: Stations have been set up at Probation offices and at our Center of Reentry Excellence (CORE) to assist clients with getting set up to be vaccinated; Probation will engage our health services partner to find out how people in encampments are being signed up to receive vaccinations – one shot vaccination may be better for transient population
12. CAB Retreat & Team Building: Prefer in person – need space for 14-15 people with social distancing
13. Public Comment: Conversation around the importance/oversight of community based organizations
