**1. Call to Order** – The meeting was called to order at 1:03 PM.

**2. Public Comment on Any item Listed Below as for "Discussion" only** – There were no public comments.

**3. CCPEC Community Outreach Event Sponsorship Grant Applications (Discussion and Action) – Janene Grigsby  
CAB Approved**

A. Request to approve the following CCPEC Community Outreach Event Sponsorship Grant Applications:

- a. \$10,000 for [Oakland Communities United for Equity & Justice: Annual Every Day is Black History](#)
- b. \$10,000 for [Heart for People: Celebrate the Decade](#)

B. Discussion

- a. *Can we be reminded of the parameters of this grant?* Response: It's supposed to really be just a community event supporting the reentry realignment community in Alameda County. Many organizations we don't directly contract with are doing great work and hosting activities that directly support the people we serve. This is our way to sponsor those efforts and get funding into their hands so they can engage more people in the community. The goal is low-barrier access to modest funding, enough to support events many nonprofits are hosting that make a significant impact within our county.
- b. *What is the anticipated number of people expected to attend?* Response: Oakland Communities United for Equity & Justice, about 750 people could be brought in, at least 25% of whom are systems-impacted. Heart for People expects 70 to 80 people on both days.
- c. *In Heart for People's application, the event includes worship and bringing people closer to Christ. My question is about the use of government funding for religious activities. Has County Counsel or anyone else reviewed this issue?* Response: The requested funding will not support any religious ceremony. The organization is hosting a two-day event at a church, which holds regular Sunday services regardless of our funding. Our funding would cover venue rental and event-related expenses outlined in the budget, including food, grocery boxes, T-shirts, clothing for people experiencing homelessness, a videographer, flyers, marketing, banners, and an entertainment stipend. None of the funds would be used directly for religious activities.

    - 1. *Reviewing the expiring contracts, it appears that the transportation contract with Bona Fide and the employment contract with Five Keys are both expected to sunset—the transportation contract at the end of March and the employment contract at the end of June this year. Is that correct?* Response: Yes.
    - 2. *It doesn't appear that there are any RFPs being developed or scopes of work in progress for either of those contracts. Is that correct?* Response: Yes. The employment contract has an extension available and will come forward as part of the annual allocation. For transportation, there is sufficient funding to pursue an extension if needed. You will also see updates in March regarding the housing vendor pool and realignment housing.
    - 3. *Is the expectation that the Housing Pathways scope of work will be ready in time for replacement, or are you planning to extend those contracts?* Response: We will be submitting a request to extend those contracts, specifically for our housing vendor pool and H&H's housing just recently completed an RFP.
    - 4. *For the Early Intervention Court, is it correct that nothing is currently being developed for replacement?* Response: Nothing has been highlighted for January, as any funding needs will be addressed in March.
    - 5. *If there are any issues with extending the contracts or planning for future years, will those be identified in March, and should we otherwise expect a continuation of the current arrangements for those expiring this year?* Response: So, for the most part, yes. We've been working on the annual allocation, and most programs aren't expected to receive new funding. In March, there won't be new programs funded; most of the funding will be for contract extensions as part of the annual allocation.
    - 6. *Do we anticipate any growth, or will that be determined by the organizations themselves?* Response: Some growth is expected on certain projects, but the details are still being finalized. In February and March, as we go through fiscal and procurement processes, those plans will be discussed.

**B. Process and Evaluation (Discussion) – Rodney Brooks, Designee for Brendon Woods**

- a. The Process and Evaluation Work Group has been developing a toolkit to assist people with lived experience working with CBOs who have AB 109 contracts. The toolkit will feature a sample letter template explaining each part—who to communicate with and why certain subjects are important. Community members, Probation staff, and the Sheriff’s Department have supported the work, and the final toolkit should be ready for new contractors within the next 30 to 60 days.

**C. Programs and Services (Discussion) – Corrine Lee, Designee for Brian Ford**

- a. The Program and Services Work Group was on a brief hiatus in 2025 while we expanded our Program Design and Development Unit and established new processes. I’m pleased to announce that the Program and Services Work Group will resume in 2026. Our first session is expected in April, and we will keep everyone informed. The work group will continue to gather community feedback, collaborate with community partners, engage the reentry population, involve county service partners, and end-users themselves, providing a space to guide future programming.
- b. Faris Wallace: I’m really looking forward to moving our work forward in this space. While the work group has been on hiatus, we’re excited to reconnect with our community partners, whose voices are essential to this work. This platform will serve as that space. The team has been diligent—Corinne has already shared our processes—and everyone’s passion aligns with our collective goals. I’m eager to help lead a collaborative workspace and grateful for the opportunity to officially meet everyone, including those I already know.

**5. Community Advisory Board Updates (Discussion) – Janene Grigsby on behalf of Douglas Butler, CAB Vice Chair**

- A. District 3 appointed three new CAB members to the CAB. Open seats remain in Districts 1 and 2, while Districts 3, 4, and 5 are full. Individuals who live or work in Districts 1 or 2 and are interested in participating in the CCP process are encouraged to apply. CAB members provide input on matters before the CCPC, making recommendations and representing community perspectives, which are incorporated into the decision-making process.

**6. Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) Updates (Discussion) – Janene Grigsby**

- A. CCP Generational Wealth Subcommittee Updates (Discussion) – Chairs Shani Shay and Charles Turner
  - a. Charles Turner: As part of the CCP Generational Wealth Committee, which I co-chair with my good friend Shani Shay, we’ve developed panels on financial literacy to educate the community. Our next goal is to increase community outreach, starting with our upcoming meeting at the West Oakland Resource Center. Being in the community allows us to reach more people, with support from Open Door Resource and local libraries posting materials. Our focus is on sharing financial literacy and wealth-building information, especially during challenging times. I’m grateful that many providers have volunteered to present, offering expertise in finance and education, and I hope this becomes a standard practice moving forward.
