4.	JJCPA/YOBG Presentation on JJCC Responsibilities and Next Steps	 The JJCPA/YOBG Plan & Future Funding Strategies Presentation was shown and discussed. JJCPA funding can be used for prevention programs. This plan must be updated and submitted annually. There needs to be a discussion regarding what the updated plan should look like. Considering the demographics data, how can we better reach the population that needs the services most. An RFP was just put out to contract services for the next three years. This is the time to start because it will take one to two years to put this together. 	
		Questions: Provide more information regarding expenditures. Out of the \$13M, what is the total obligation to JJCPA and YOBG? We need to get back to you. We have trust dollars left over from previous years and we are spending them down now.	Provide additional funding info to committee.

	serves both probation and at-promise youth. The YOBG only serves	
	youth on probation. The pre-adjudicated youth are served through	
	the YOBG funds.

	There are many pathways to get referred to services: court, DPO, self	shows how the

	When referrals are done, where do they go? When is an	WOIKS.

	Usually, the DPOs make referrals. Some are court ordered.	
	Assessments are made at multiple points, such as Intake, Medical,	
	Mental Health, school, etc. The DPO needs to make a plan for the	
	youth after reviewing all assessments. The service providers also	
	make their own assessments. How should this be streamlined?	

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	Now CalAIM is starting, that also requires their own plans. Patient	
	navigator is a new position in Facilities that is involved 90 days prior	
	to youth being released and will provide a warm handoff.	
	What tool does Probation use?	
	Probation uses YLS assessment to give us information regarding	
	youth's needs.	
	How did Probation decide on what services the DPN provides?	
	We checked the data, had focus groups, and discussed with probation	
	staff. We are trying to meet the needs of the population. Questions to	
	address: Do the services prevent as intended? Will they change the	
	demographics? Do the services need to be more prescriptive?	
	Hayward seems to be the model of how to make referrals, what can we learn from them? How do we work with OUSD?	
	The referral process should not dictate who is getting the services	
	if that's not who has the highest needs.	
	Many kids did not return to school after COVID, so they are not	
	getting referred. Probation is working on an MOU and Contract for	
	\$11M with ACOE to mitigate truancy and provide interventions.	
	Does ACOE affect Oakland?	
	Yes. ACOE are experts in education, so they will issue RFPs. There is	
	concern regarding capacity.	
	What age are we targeting?	
	With the new iteration of contracts, the age was reduced down to	
	eight years old.	
	How much of the funding is going to that age group?	
	We don't have that information.	
	Is there a way to inform those that make referrals that services exist?	
	There are on-going efforts such as posting the DPN service map,	
	juvenile services mapping project, gap analysis, and an upcoming	
	website that will assist with connecting youth to services. Probation	
	has meetings with OUSD to discuss how to disseminate the	
	information. We host outreach events such as Positive Futures Fairs.	
	Next fair is at Castlemont High School so youth and community can	
	learn about services available to them. The new iteration of contracts	
	provides funds to the providers specifically to do outreach.	
	Have the programs been evaluated?	
	A full-time Research and Evaluation director is in the hiring process.	
	One of his duties will be to evaluate the programs.	
	Probation receives and evaluates deidentified data from Mobius. In	
	2023, 75% of providers indicated that youth successfully completed	
	programming.	

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	Do the assessments show a great need for mental health services?	
	Do the agencies have the capacity to meet those needs?	
	Staffing has been the #1 issue. The County competes for professionals	
	with the CBOs. There are not enough students in the majors. We	
	cannot keep up with the demand from families and state mandates. Licensed clinicians need to be paid the same as MDs.	
	Licensed cuniciuns need to be paid the sume as MDs.	
	Can YOBG funds be used as supplement to get more mental	
	health professionals in the County?	
	Mental health can look like Occupational therapy, Art therapy, or	
	playing sports. Kids don't always need to talk about feelings. In	
	Facilities, we supplement with robust programming to help with kids'	
	overall wellbeing. There are various dynamics that happen in	
	facilities, and keeping kids busy with engaging programs is crucial.	
	A prevention program that specifically targets African American	
	males is the OK program where Probation officers are stationed at	
	two Oakland high schools and partners with OPD. This program	
	needs to be funded and expanded.	
	What does meaningful mental health services look like in our	
	current condition? What is culturally responsive? What can	
	make it more successful?	
	How can we make comprehensive assessments? For example, if there is a COST meeting dealing with transport is the youth being	
	there is a COST meeting dealing with truancy, is the youth being seen as a whole person? Is truancy due to mental health,	
	substance use, or a need for IEP? Referrals are provided for	
	different issues, but it's only one part of the same problem.	
	What does healing look like in families? How can we support the	
	families as some have been system involved for generations.	
	We are competing against groups that tell kids they can make a	
	quick buck. We need to rethink job and employment processes.	
	Wrap-around programs serve the youth, but they also include the	
	parents and provide family therapy. We need to focus on prevention	
	and support families with elementary-aged kids. Probation cannot combat poverty on their own. How do we fund these programs as the	
	younger kids are not on probation.	
	The DA's office requested to have a step-by-step referral process	
	guide that can be provided to law enforcement or anyone that	Email the DPN

	DPN brochures are available but need to be updated once the RFP	Smith, DA
	process is complete.	
	Probation will soon have a Community Ligison position for youth	
	Probation will soon have a Community Liaison position for youth that do not have a probation status but need assistance. The DPO in	
	this position will case manage kids without probation status.	
	Can we get some social workers on board to work with families?
