707 (b) Adjudications, DJJ Commitments, and Secure Track Sustained Totals (Cumulative)

- <u>87</u> 707(b) referrals sustained during the reporting period across <u>75</u> individual youth
- <u>0</u> youth were committed to DJJ
- <u>0</u> youth returned from DJJ
- <u>1</u> reinstated commitment to SYTF
- <u>9</u> new commitments to SYTF

Youth Eligible for SYTF Under WIC 875(a)

- <u>152</u> youth with a sustained 707(b) offense were active to probation during the quarter
 - <u>132</u> (87%) youth were male
 - <u>20</u> (13%) youth were female
 - <u>109</u> (72%) youth were Black
 - <u>31</u> (20%) youth were Hispanic

Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF*

- <u>13</u> youth were committed to SYTF as of December 31, 2024
 - <u>100%</u> of youth were court ordered
 - <u>100%</u> of youth were male
 - <u>31%</u> of youth were from Oakland
 - The average age of youth was <u>18.2</u>
 - The average length of time in SYTF <u>311.4</u> days

Race of Youth Committed to SYTF (n = 13)



Overview of Youth Committed to SYTF Cont.*

- For the 13 youth, the average
 - Number of referrals prior to SYTF commitment was <u>6.0</u>
 - Number of bookings prior to SYTF commitment was <u>3.2</u>
 - Number of true findings prior to SYTF commitment was <u>2.5</u>
 - Time between 1st referral and SYTF commitment was <u>3.2</u> years



Most Serious Sustained Offense for Youth Committed to SYTF (n = 13)

Step-downs and Closures*

As of December 31, 2024,

- <u>5</u> youth were on step-down from SYTF to a less restrictive program
 - These programs included step-down to Camp, community supervision, and interstate compact.
- <u>21</u> youth had their Secure Track grant closed
 - This includes youth with jurisdiction transfers and youth whose cases were closed out with the ACPD due to a transfer on interstate compact (IC), in addition to youth whose cases were closed due to their term ending, being discharged early, or an unsuccessful completion.
 - As of December 31, 2024, 3 youth were closed out due to jurisdictional and IC transfers.
 - One (1) youth was removed from the previous closure count to reflect their case being reopened.
