To continue providing over 2000 residence primarily residing in zip codes 94603, 94605, 94621 and 94601 with Easter Baskets and activities for the whole family and back to school supplies and support, including backpacks, shoes, books, cosmetic items and educational tools.
- 2. **Please provide the date and location of the event:** These events take place at our facility at 977 66<sup>th</sup> Ave, Oakland, 94621. The Easter event will take place in April 2026 and the Back to School Giveaway in July 2026, specific dates TBD.
- 3. Who is the target audience of the event? Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) and CMTC students and their families. Some of our students and families are justice impacted as a result of county, state and federal convictions for a variety of offenses. Although, most of the residents reside in zip codes 94603, 94605 and 94621, a significant number of residents live in the Fremont High zip code area, 94601.
- 4. What are the expected outcomes of the event? To help reduce hunger, providing participants with nutritional food options and to provide educational support. We want everyone to be able to function in the community as responsible, respectful citizens, which is hard to do when you are being deprived and are hungry. Formerly incarcerated individuals also get the benefit of helping put on these events and support those in their community.

  CMTC's Life Skills/Employment Preparation program provides workshops, classes, and videos on establishing and maintaining emotional balance and physical well-being. Whereas, Lend a Hand Foundation (LAHF) provides referrals for students who seek various services outside of OUSD, and has instituted a new high school scholarship program. This collaboration between CMTC and LAHF supports the Generational Wealth subcommittee's goals by offering skill-building and educational opportunities, and the Generational Health subcommittee by helping students and their families establish and maintain emotional balance and physical well-being.

The Back to School giveaway will further the goals of the Generational Wealth subcommittee by offering educational supports and supplies. While the Generational Health subcommittee's goal will be supported by providing food and healthy family activities during our Easter event in collaboration with Hope to the Heart. In addition to supporting our events, Hope to the Heart provides grocery and produce items to CMTC to distribute to students and community members every Thursday.

- 7. **How much will it cost to operate the event?** Approximately \$26,000

The staff at CMTC cannot overemphasize our gratitude and appreciation to the CCPEC for

the opportunity to apply for the Community Outreach Event Sponsorship Program Grant.

### Introduction

The funding will be used to assist in providing financial support for CMTC. CMTC was established in 1993. Despite the success of the program preparing and training men and women for employment in the Building Trades unions, Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD) and Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) the organization is addressing some financial challenges. CMTC graduates are highly regarded by the Building Trades Unions and Utility companies.

CMTC utilizes its facility to provide multiple services for residents primarily in East Oakland
Zip Codes 94603, 94605 and 94621. Residents of all three Zip Codes have been heavily
impacted by the Criminal Justice system as both victims and perpetrators. The Zip
Codes represent a significant number of Probationers, Parolees, violent crime areas,
sex trafficking, and poverty related conditions.

According to American Community Survey (ACS), states Poverty in Oakland affects approximately 14-30% of residents, varying by data source each year, with the city's poverty

rate being higher than the national average. High housing costs, racial disparities, and unemployment contribute to significant poverty, particularly in neighborhoods in Zip Codes like 9403, 94605 and 94621.

# **CMTC Overview**

The Cypress Mandela Training Center is a 501© 3 non-profit that operates a dynamic 16-week green construction pre-apprenticeship training for men and women to learn the basic construction techniques and the fundamentals of construction. The training includes how to use tools and equipment safely, there is an electrical and carpentry component, life skills classes and workshops are conducted during the 16-week training sessions. Physical training, math classes and financial literacy are integral parts of the curriculum.

During the 16-week training for each cohort, representatives from all the unions connected with the Alameda County Building Trades provide representation for each union and some trades provide supplemental training. Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E), East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD) and the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) appear at each cohort to provide information for the students. Many of the students have been employed annually by PG&E after graduating from the PG&E Pathways Program.

CMTC's goal is to prepare our students to function in the community as responsible productive citizens. All aspects of safety are emphasized during the entire period of training. Safety is of paramount importance during training and on the job sites.

### Lend a Hand Foundation

CMTC established a viable partnership with Lend a Hand Foundation (LAHF) in 2019.

LAHF goal is to serve nearly 2,000 youth through its Back-to-School Giveaways, Easter Basket Workshops, Holiday Giving Programs, Teen Talk Tuesday Program, and the Homeless to Adulthood Project. The LAHF works closely with schools and community.

LAHF was established in 1997 to provide support for underserved students in the Oakland School District (OUSD) and some surrounding areas in Alameda County. The foundation provides educational products tools, food, clothing, shoes and other essentials for school aged children, youth and their families.

The primary goal of the collaboration between CMTC and LAHF is to continue providing services for over 2000 residents during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

Services are also provided for Easter Activities and Back to School Giveaways that include school supplies and materials. Cosmetic items, shoes, books and educational toys and games are also distributed.

CMTC provides the facility and volunteers to unload the trucks, process the merchandise and distribute it to the families of the children and young folks that live in the surrounding

areas. Many of the parents and family members of the children are Justice Impacted.

On July 26th, over 200 backpacks containing school supplies were distributed to students and their families.

During the holidays a variety of food items that include turkeys and hams and other gifts will be distributed to many families. The distributions are normally conducted on the weekends and evenings. Merchandise not distributed to the families at the Giveaways is stored at the CMTC facility and provided to the CMTC students and their families. Some of our students and their family members are Justice Impacted as a result of county, state and federal convictions for a variety of offenses.

A segment of CMTC's Life Skills/Employment Preparation program Provides workshops, classes and videos on establishing and maintaining emotional balance and physical wellbeing. LAHF provides referrals for students who seek various services outside of OUSD and have instituted a new high school scholarship program.

## Conclusion

As stated earlier in the request, CMTC is addressing some financial challenges. The \$10,000.00 requested will help with the cost to compensate staff for additional work on the weekends and evenings to prepare and distribute food and gifts to our much-needed community members. Although, most of the residents reside in Zip Codes 94603, 94605, and 94621, a significant number of residents live in the Fremont High Zip Code area 94601.

As a result of some of our students struggling financially and having housing challenges, CMTC has a partnership with Hope to the Heart that provides grocery and produce items for CMTC to distribute to the students and community members on Thursdays.
